Dryness of the cornea and disruption to corneal epithelial surface lining may result in sequelae of corneal abrasion, erosion, infection, ulceration, scarring, rupture or blindness (5).

### **Making a Difference in Eye Care of the Critically Ill ...**

It is also recommended that; the rates of iatrogenic ophthalmologic complications are monitored; referral is made in a timely manner for any suspected iatrogenic ophthalmologic complications; eyelid closure is maintained if eyelid closure cannot be maintained passively; all patients who cannot achieve eyelid closure independently should receive eye care every 2h.

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### **Evidence-based eye care set is beneficial for critically ...**

Ventilated, critically ill patients have an increased risk of corneal exposure and microbial keratitis; however there is evidence that eye care is a neglected area of patient care. An audit of eye surface disease and eye care documentation revealed a problem within one general intensive care unit (GICU).

### **Essential nursing care of the critically ill patient**

It is primarily intended to help non-ophthalmic ICU staff to: 1.protect the eye in vulnerable patients, thus preventing ICU-related eye problems 2. identify disease affecting the eye in ITU patients, and specifically those which might need ophthalmic referral 3. deliver treatment to the eye when it is prescribed
