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Ukiyoe The Art Of The
Ukiyo-e (Japanese: "pictures of the floating world") one of the most important genres of art of the Tokugawa period (1603-1867) in Japan. The style is a mixture of the realistic narrative of the emaki ("picture scrolls") produced in the Kamakura period and the mature decorative style of the Momoyama and Tokugawa periods.

Ukiyo-e is a genre of woodblock prints and paintings which flourished in Japanese art from the late 17th to late 19th century. Aimed at the prosperous merchant class in the urbanizing Edo period (1603-1868), its subjects included female beauties; kabuki actors and sumo wrestlers; scenes from history and folktales; travel scenes and landscapes; flora and fauna; and erotica.

The word ukiyo refers to the world of common people and e means "picture." Thus when ukiyo-e first emerged in the late sixteenth century, it usually depicted everyday life in the city of Kyoto. It wasn't until the eighteenth century that ukiyo-e became a popular art form, though, thanks partly to advances in woodblock printing techniques.
